Holocaust Exhibit and Social Lab Tour 3 hours 7th grade and above

Students actively explore the dynamics of prejudice and discrimination historically and today. In the Holocaust Exhibit, students receive a card that reveals the story of a child whose life was changed by the Holocaust. Promoting critical thinking and youth empowerment, experiences in the Social Lab challenge students to examine themes such as the power of words and images, contemporary human and civil rights, and the importance of speaking up. Facilitated reflections support the students as they engage with the exhibits.



Anne Tour 1.5 Hours 5th grade and above

The tour will shed light on Anne Frank's family background and reveal little-known details of Anne's childhood. Students will examine artifacts and discover connections between Anne Frank and America. The experience concludes with the period after the arrest of everyone from the Secret Annex. Students will be inspired by the legacy and lessons of her writing and timeless voice.

Steps to Tolerance 2.5 hours

5th and 6th grade

An interactive Museum experience designed for 5th and 6th grade students. It provides an age-appropriate introduction to Holocaust history and discussion of current issues, including bullying and antisemitism. With 85+ students, Steps includes a component of the Anne Frank exhibit.

- Hear Holocaust Survivor testimony
- Examine World War II and Holocaust artifacts and photographs
- Investigate the roles of perpetrator, target, bystander, and ally
- Vote their opinions in an interactive bullying prevention workshop

7th grade and above
